Course title: A Philosophy of Vision

Course type: Seminar

Course content: We shall discuss the meaning and significance of vision in experience in general. We shall start with a classical text (Diderot), and then focus on phenomenology (Sartre, Merleau-Ponty, Lévinas, Marion). We shall also read authors from the psychoanalytical tradition (Lacan), from post-structuralism (Foucault) and art history (Didi-Huberman). Fundamental philosophical issues, closely connected to vision, shall also be discussed such as the problem of consciousness, the relation of mind and body, the relation of the I and the other, and so forth.

Requirements: Regular attendance (3 classes may be missed), active participation in the discussions, submission of an essay at the end of the semester
