Course type:	Seminar Compulsory for first year students in Film Theory specialisation! Max. 4 ppl.
Course content:	This seminar is designed specifically for first-year film theory specialisation students and will facilitate the preparation of a Master's thesis built on individual research and analysis. Using key primary and secondary theoretical texts, the module explores the methods used in film (and media) studies research including quantitative, qualitative, interpretive and rhetorical methods; formulating research questions, planning and designing the research, data collection, data analysis and interpretation. Allowing every student to follow their own particular research topic, the training will cover the various aspects of conceiving, pursuing, organizing, and working on research projects in film studies.
Requirements:	 Presentations: During the semester each participant has to hold two inclass presentations related to his/her research project, and two methodological presentation on a topic specified with the instructor. Weekly tasks: Students will have to complete different weekly tasks related to their research project. The documents should be sent to the instructor until the selected deadlines. Class participation: Continuous attendance and in-class activity is required. 4 or more absences result in an incomplete for the course. Students arriving more than 10 minutes after the class starts will be marked as not presents. No student will receive a final grade without the in-class presentations and more than two missing weekly tasks. First class on the first week!
