Course title: Contemporary Global Cinema: authors and nations

Course content: This class is designed as a selective course for global contemporary film after Italian Neorealism. It does not attempt to cover the development of the medium in a comprehensive way, but rather engages with chosen authors and/or national cinemas that proved influential from a stylistic/narrative perspective. The english-language course is recommended for students as an introduction to contemporary cinema.
