Course type: Lecture

Course content: The course will explore major themes and trends in post-1990/contemporary

cinema. Special attention will be given to the interconnected

questions/problems of globalization and digitization (Americanization vs world cinema, reframing of national cinemas, transnationalism, cultural borrowings and remakes). Besides discussing the transformation of the Hollywood film industry and American independent cinema, the course will examine trends of European, Latin-American and South-East Asian cinemas (film cultures,

genres and global/local auteurs).

give a presentation during the course.
